
## A NEW KIND OF FAMILY

Joined with Jesus' prediction of his suffering and death at human hands, the scene in which Jesus is expected to pay the temple tax because he is regarded as a foreigner rather than as the Son of God, harkens back to the line from the opening of John's Gospel, "He was in the world, and the world came to be through him, but the world did not know him. He came to what was his own, but his people did not accept him" (*John* 1:10-11).

In our world today, we find that many people continue to reject Christ and resist his radical kingdom values. Christ and his teachings of justice, equality, respect, mutual flourishing and peace are frequently marginalised by politics, media and culture.



As Christians, we are called to hold the powerful to account and to speak God's kingdom of justice and peace into a world of ever-increasing confusion and hurt. We are also called to watch for Christ and to recognise where He is already at work in the world, not only acknowledging his presence but speaking out about what we see and hear of God as we look for signs of His kingdom breaking through.

So, let us continue to yearn for the Kingdom of God - a community of love where everybody is valued, loved and respected - and seek to build that kingdom both in our parish and in the wider world. We could do this through our willingness to challenge prejudice, injustice, inequality and poverty, and also through prayer, contemplation, love, and practical action.
